2. About Somnath Temple

Location and Significance

1. Located at Prabhas Patan along Saurashtra coast in Gujarat
2. Among India's most sacred pilgrimage centres
3. Strategically positioned along Arabian Sea shoreline
4. Ancient maritime trade route location

Origin and Mythology

1. Origins deeply embedded in ancient Indian tradition

Characteristics

3. Historical Phases

Attacks and Destruction

1. Most turbulent phase began in eleventh century
2. January 1026: First recorded attack by Mahmud of Ghani
3. Beginning of long period of repeated destruction (11th-18th centuries)
4. Temple targeted multiple times by Muslim invaders and Portuguese
5. Each destruction followed by restoration demonstrating resilience

Restoration Efforts

1. Despite repeated destruction, temple rebuilt several times by local rulers and devotees
2. 12th Century: Kumar apala restored the temple
3. 13th Century: King of Junagarh rebuilt temple
4. 18th Century: Lokmata Ahilyabai Holkar, Maratha queen of Indore, consecrated new temple after yet another destruction
5. Continuous pattern of destruction and restoration

Post-Independence Reconstruction

1. 1947: Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel visited ruins and resolved to rebuild temple
2. Present temple constructed in Kailash Mahameru Prasad architectural style
3. Rebuilt in Chaulukya style of Hindu temple architecture
4. Reconstruction overseen by Vallabhbhai Patel
5. Completed in May 1951
6. May 11, 1951: Temple ceremonially consecrated by President Dr. Rajendra Prasad
7. Dedication to nation symbolizing independent India's cultural revival

4. Veer Hamirji Gohil

Historical Context

1. Regional warrior defending Somnath Temple in 1299 AD during Zafar Khan's invasion
2. Sacrificed life protecting sacred shrine
3. Remembered through local tradition and collective memory rather than official historical records

Significance
