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1. The forgotten co-pilot of Air India flight 171 (TH)

GS Paper III / II – Infrastructure / Internal Security / Governance

Topic – Infrastructure – Electricity, Ports, Roads, Airports, Railways etc.; Role of media and social networking sites in internal security challenges; Important aspects of governance, transparency and accountability.

Sub-Topic – Aviation Safety, Air Accident Investigation Bureau (AAIB), Technical Analysis of Flight Data Recorders (EAFR/CVR), Inter-Agency Data Sharing, and Crisis Governance.

1. Introduction

1. **Context of the Crisis** – A year has passed since the crash of Air India flight AI-171 on June 12, 2025, which cost 260 lives.
2. **Lack of Transparency** – The Ministry of Civil Aviation (MoCA) and the Air Accident Investigation Bureau (AAIB) have failed to publish a final report, leaving only a preliminary report from July 2025 available.
3. **Investigation Deviations** – The author points out hidden indicators in the preliminary report that contradict mainstream media narratives, social media rumours, and official explanations.
4. **Shift in Bureaucratic Response** – Instead of blaming the pilot—the usual practice of the MoCA and the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA)—there is a defensive stance toward the captain, while ignoring structural errors from the airline and manufacturer.

2. Media Narratives vs. Preliminary Report Facts

1. **Recorder Location** – The forward Enhanced Airborne Flight Recorder (EAFR), which tracks both digital flight data and cockpit voice data, was recovered on June 16, 2025, next to "Building F".
2. **Immediate High-Level Alerts** – Based on the Cockpit Voice Recorder (CVR) data, the AAIB immediately alerted the MoCA and the Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) on June 16.
3. **Threat Perceptions** – Citing intelligence inputs and a perceived threat, the MHA granted X-category commando security to the head of the AAIB on the same day.
4. **Public Information Deficit** – While the AAIB chief continues to receive taxpayer-funded protection, the victims' families and the travelling public remain uninformed.

3. The Fuel Control Switch (FCS) Controversy

1. **The "Transitioning" Myth** – Media and social platforms claim the Fuel Control Switches (FCS) moved from "run" to "cut-off" and back to "run" after a few seconds, alleging software errors or American influence on the report.

2. **Mechanical Realities** – The FCS on the Boeing 787 is a spring-loaded mechanical switch that requires a physical human action—lifting it out of the run slot, moving it over the gate, and dropping it into the cut-off slot.
3. **Immunity to Code Errors** – Moving this switch cannot be triggered by a software glitch or an internal electrical power failure.
4. **The Crucial CVR Evidence** – The report notes one pilot asking the other why they cut off the engines, to which the other replied that they did not do so.
5. **Withheld Audio Data** – The remaining CVR recordings were shared only with the MoCA and the MHA for threat evaluation, keeping them hidden from public review.

4. Technical Realities – The Ram Air Turbine (RAT) Red Herring

1. **The Divergent Focus** – Discussions around the exact deployment timing of the Ram Air Turbine (RAT) are being used by interested parties to deflect from the core problem of engine cut-off.
2. **The Sequence of Events** – The report shows the RAT hydraulic pump began supplying pressure at 08 –08 –47 UTC, indicating it deployed at 08 –08 –42 UTC—exactly five seconds earlier.
3. **Immediate Cut-off Consequences** – As soon as the aircraft reached its maximum airspeed of 180 knots at 08 –08 –42 UTC, both engine FCS were moved to the cut-off position within one second of each other.
4. **The Power Shutoff** – Cutting both engines immediately caused the co-pilot's instrument panel to go blank and shut off power to the rear EAFR.
5. **Data Recovery Limits** – The rear EAFR became useless, and critical backup data would have been permanently lost if the forward EAFR data had not been successfully recovered.
6. **RAT Deployment Rules** – The Boeing 787 manual outlines four automatic conditions for RAT deployment to provide backup power, though it can also be deployed manually via a switch.
7. **The Final Verification** – The exact reasons for the RAT deployment will be verified by looking at the EAFR telemetry and the sound files recorded on the CVR.

5. The Co-pilot's Actions and Institutional Failures

1. **Standard Operational Procedure (SOP)** – In a major take-off emergency, the captain must assume control, while the co-pilot moves to monitoring duties.
2. **The System Deficit** – CVR and EAFR data show if this handoff occurred. First Officer Clive Kunder faced a blank screen, zero operational guidance, and dual engine failure.
3. **Manual Flying Success** – The FCS data shows delays in moving the switches for engines 1 and 2 (at 08 –08 –52 and 08 –08 –56 UTC). Despite having no prior training for this manoeuvre, the co-pilot steered the aircraft away from crowded residential zones with his right hand while trying to restart the engines with his left.
4. **Deliberate Human Intervention** – A software or power error is impossible; one of the two pilots deliberately cut the engines.
5. **The Credibility Crisis** – By delaying these findings, the AAIB and MoCA harm the international reputation of India's aviation system.
6. **The Threat of International Exposure** – Agencies like the US NTSB and the UK AAIB have greater experience deciphering flight recorders. India risks public embarrassment if international bodies release their own findings, as occurred with the SilkAir (1997) and China Eastern (2022) crashes, which were ruled as "Deliberate Human Intervention".
7. **The Need for Closure** – Providing closure for the families of First Officer Kunder and the 260 victims requires releasing the full, unedited truth.

Air transport infrastructure requires strict safety standards and transparent investigation systems to maintain public trust and ensure international compliance. However, recent controversies surrounding high-casualty crashes, such as Air India flight AI-171, reveal significant gaps in India's regulatory and investigative framework. Delays in releasing final reports and a lack of transparency run counter to effective disaster governance.

2. Structural and Regulatory Gaps in the Investigation Framework

Based on recent aviation safety assessments, several key weaknesses persist within the domestic system -

1. **Delays in Investigative Transparency** - Investigating bodies like the Air Accident Investigation Bureau (AAIB) often rely on preliminary reports, delaying final conclusions and leaving the public and victims' families uninformed.
2. **Inter-Agency Data Secrecy** - Critical technical data from the Cockpit Voice Recorder (CVR) and Enhanced Airborne Flight Recorder (EAFR) is often shared exclusively with ministries (MoCA/MHA) under a security or threat perspective, rather than being released for open safety reviews.
3. **Susceptibility to Speculative Narratives** - A lack of clear communication from regulators like the DGCA allows speculative or false narratives to spread on social and mainstream media, which harms the credibility of the aviation sector.
4. **Technical Limitations in Data Analysis** - Domestic agencies often lack the advanced technical expertise needed to decode complex flight data, running the risk of international bodies (like the US NTSB or UK AAIB) releasing independent findings that contradict domestic reports.
5. **Ignoring Alternative Human Factors** - Investigations sometimes focus on technical errors or protect senior crew members, overlooking potential instances of "Deliberate Human Intervention" or the actions of junior crew during a crisis.

3. Measures for Institutional Reform

To restore international credibility and improve safety standards, India should implement the following reforms -

1. **Establishing an Independent Investigative Body** - Separating the AAIB completely from the Ministry of Civil Aviation to prevent administrative interference and ensure objective, unbiased investigations.
2. **Setting Strict Timelines for Final Reports** - Mandating the public release of comprehensive accident reports within a fixed 12-month window, similar to international best practices.
3. **Upgrading Technical Analysis Capabilities** - Investing in local digital laboratories to decode EAFR, CVR, and flight telemetry data independently, reducing reliance on foreign safety boards.
4. **Improving Whistle-blower Protection** - Setting up secure, confidential channels for co-pilots and cabin crew to report safety violations or operational pressures without fear of professional retaliation.

Conclusion

Ensuring aviation safety requires moving beyond casual bureaucratic reviews toward deep institutional transparency. By making the AAIB independent, setting clear timelines for public reports, and improving technical analysis capabilities, India can build a reliable aviation ecosystem that protects passenger safety and maintains international standards.

2. How Birsa Munda Helped Define Adivasi Identity, Rights (IE)

Topic - Modern Indian history from about the middle of the eighteenth century until the present—significant events, personalities, issues; Welfare schemes for vulnerable sections of the population by the Centre and States.

Sub-Topic - Birsa Munda and the Ulgulan Rebellion, Chotanagpur Tenancy (CNT) Act 1908, Khuntkatti Land System, and the Scheduled Tribes Delisting Debate.

1. Introduction

1. **The Anniversary Pledge** - On June 9, the death anniversary of iconic tribal leader Birsa Munda, several tribal organizations in Jharkhand pledged to protect his historical legacy.
2. **The Delisting Controversy** - This event took place amidst fresh political demands for "delisting"—a proposal to remove tribal individuals who convert to Christianity or Islam from the Scheduled Tribes (ST) list.
3. **The Institutional Background** - The latest formal demand for delisting was raised during a tribal gathering in May 2026, which was attended by Union Home Minister Amit Shah in Delhi.
4. **The Identity Clash** - Jharkhand's tribal organizations argue that Birsa Munda's core vision was deeply rooted in a unified Adivasi identity, land sovereignty, and customary rights, accusing modern right-wing groups of twisting his historical outlook.

2. Who was Birsa Munda?

1. **Geographic Baseline** - He stands as one of the most influential historical figures of the Chotanagpur plateau, a mineral-rich region spanning modern Jharkhand and adjoining states.
2. **Revered Title** - He is widely revered across tribal communities as "**Dharti Aba**" (Father of the Earth).
3. **The Ulgulan Leadership** - He is remembered for leading the **Ulgulan**, or the "**Great Tumult**"—a major historical movement organized against British colonial rule and oppressive *diku* (non-tribal outsider) zamindars.
4. **The Late 19th Century Context** - The rebellion emerged during the closing years of the 19th century in direct response to the heavy encroachment on Adivasi land, culture, and local institutions.
5. **Socio-Political Impact** - Historian K. S. Singh, in his study *Birsa Munda and His Movement*, characterized Birsa as a religious reformer, social mobilizer, and political leader who transformed Munda tribal society.
6. **The Scope of Ideology** - Adivasi historian Joseph Bara notes that Birsa did not merely lead an agrarian uprising; he articulated a broader vision encompassing Adivasi identity, autonomy, land rights, and absolute self-rule (*disum*).
7. **Modern Relevance** - His prominence in mainstream public and political discourse grew significantly during the decades leading up to and following the creation of Jharkhand state in 2000.

3. From Resistance to Statehood – The Climax of Ulgulan

1. **The Dumbari Buru Climax** – The Ulgulan reached its operational climax at Dumbari Buru, a hill located in a Khunti village, in January 1899.
2. **The Gathering** – Thousands of Birsa's followers gathered at this site to assert their rights over local land and directly challenge British colonial authority.
3. **The Massacre** – British forces surrounded the hill and opened fire into the gathering. While official colonial records estimate a small toll, Adivasi oral memory records it as a major massacre that killed hundreds of people.
4. **The Arrest and Death** – Birsa Munda was eventually arrested by the British, imprisoned in Ranchi Jail, and died there on June 9, 1900.
5. **The Resistance Symbol** – Although the British military crushed the immediate physical uprising, Dumbari Buru turned into an enduring symbol of Adivasi resistance.
6. **The Path to Statehood** – Historian Joseph Bara highlights that the aspiration for Adivasi self-governance expressed during the Ulgulan directly influenced the mid-1900s political movement for a separate Jharkhand state led by Jaipal Singh Munda.

4. Structural Reforms – The Chotanagpur Tenancy (CNT) Act

1. **Initiating Reforms** – The intensity of the Ulgulan compelled the colonial administration to change its policies and initiate major land reforms.
2. **Recognizing Khuntkatti Rights** – These reforms culminated in the formal legal recognition of **Khuntkatti** rights and the passage of the **Chotanagpur Tenancy (CNT) Act in 1908**.
3. **The Khuntkatti System Definition** – Khuntkatti is the traditional Munda system of collective land ownership and local governance. Under this system, the descendants of the original settlers who cleared forests and established a village—known as Khuntkattidars—held collective rights over the entire village territory.
4. **The Core Objective of the CNT Act** – The central goal of the 1908 Act was to prevent the illegal transfer of Adivasi land to non-Adivasis by legally recognizing traditional land tenure systems.
5. **Modern Legal Protection** – The CNT Act remains one of the strongest, most enduring statutory safeguards for tribal land preservation in modern Jharkhand.

5. Evolutionary Religious Views and Teachings

1. **Early Education** – According to family accounts shared by a descendant, Budhram Munda, Birsa spent his early childhood at his uncle's village before studying at Christian missionary schools in Chaibasa.
2. **The Missionary Break** – His association with missionary education ended after a sharp disagreement with church authorities regarding negative remarks made about the traditional Munda community.
3. **The Vaishnavite Influence** – After distancing himself from Christianity, Birsa came under the influence of Vaishnavism for a period of time.
4. **Imprisonment and Nature Preaching** – He was jailed in 1885 for two years. Following his release, he began preaching unique spiritual teachings focused on harmony with life and nature.
5. **The Birsait Faith** – These teachings created a distinct religious movement known as the **Birsait faith**, which differed from Sarnaism (the traditional tribal faith), Christianity, and Hinduism. His followers attributed miracles to him, referring to him as "Bhagan" and "Dharti Aba".

6. Ideological Position on Religion and Identity

1. **Opposing Dual Exploitation** – Budhram Munda notes that Birsa never targeted any single religion. Instead, he opposed both the upper-caste landlords appointed as zamindars and the Christian missionaries, viewing them as two parts of the same exploitative colonial system.
2. **Ancestry over Faith** – Opposing modern demands for the delisting of Christian tribals from the ST list, family descendants highlight that member of Birsa's own extended family have followed Christianity for generations.
3. **The Core Argument** – The historical legacy of Birsa Munda shows that Adivasi identity is fundamentally defined by ancestry and community connection, rather than by personal religious choice.

The Ulgulan or the "Great Tumult" (1899–1900), led by Birsa Munda ("Dharti Aba") across the Chotanagpur plateau, stands as a landmark movement in tribal history. While triggered by immediate colonial threats to tribal land, the movement looked past basic agrarian grievances to articulate a broader framework for Adivasi identity, land sovereignty, and political self-rule (*disum*).

2. Historical Impact on Customary Land and Autonomy

The Ulgulan achieved major institutional protections by forcing the colonial state to restructure its legal approach to tribal lands –

1. **Legalization of Khuntkatti Rights** – The rebellion was a direct defence of the Khuntkatti system—the traditional Munda practice of collective land ownership by the descendants of the original forest clearers.
2. **The Chotanagpur Tenancy (CNT) Act, 1908** – The intensity of the resistance, symbolized by the tragic clash at Dumbari Buru, forced the British to pass the CNT Act of 1908. By restricting the transfer of Adivasi land to non-Adivasis, this Act established a strong, enduring statutory safeguard for tribal territory.
3. **The Blueprint for Statehood** – The search for self-governance (*disum*) popularized during the Ulgulan did not disappear after Birsa's death. It served as the ideological foundation for mid-20th century leaders like Jaipal Singh Munda, eventually culminating in the creation of Jharkhand in 2000.

Birsa Munda's legacy remains a central point in modern discussions regarding tribal rights and classification –
