

INDIA-MIDDLE EAST-EUROPE CORRIDOR – ECONOMY

NEWS: Progress in the development of the IMEC have stalled due to recent tensions between Iran and Isreal.

WHAT'S IN THE NEWS?

- Announcement: The India-Middle East-Europe Corridor (IMEC) was announced during the G20 Summit in New Delhi, September 2023.
- **Objective**: To reduce transit time and costs between the eastern and western nodes by 40% and 30% respectively, compared to the Suez Canal route.
- Significance: Expected to revolutionize international maritime trade upon completion.

Challenges Impacting Progress

- West Asian Conflicts: The escalation of the Israel-Palestine conflict in October 2023 has hindered progress, especially in the northern segment of the corridor involving West Asia.
- Arab-Israel Relations: The normalization process was disrupted, affecting cooperation between key stakeholders like Saudi Arabia and Jordan, delaying their involvement in the project.
- **Political Sensitivities**: Arab countries remain cautious about collaboration with Israel, affecting the project's northern progress until regional tensions ease.

Progress on the Eastern Leg

- India-UAE Collaboration: The eastern segment, connecting Indian ports with the UAE, is advancing steadily.
- Economic Relations: Bilateral trade between India and the UAE has seen a substantial increase following the 2022 Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement (CEPA).
 - **Trade Growth**: From \$43.30 billion in 2020-21 to \$83.64 billion in 2023-24, a 93% rise.
 - Non-Oil Trade: Shift from oil-based trade to diversified goods, with non-oil trade rising from \$28.67 billion in 2020-21 to \$57.81 billion in 2023-24.

Virtual Trade Corridor: A Key Development


- Launch: India and the UAE have initiated the Virtual Trade Corridor.
- **Purpose**: Simplification of trade processes to reduce administrative burdens, logistics costs, and improve efficiency.



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• **Strategic Role**: Serves as a pilot framework for other countries in the IMEC, potentially standardizing cross-border trade facilitation.



Current Status of IMEC Development

- East-West Disparity:
 - Eastern Segment: Progressing with economic linkages and trade facilitation.
 - Western Segment: Slowed by regional conflicts and geopolitical complexities.
- Focus on Connectivity: Only connectivity aspects, such as infrastructure and port developments, are currently advancing.
- **Delayed Projects**: Elements like clean energy exports, undersea cables, and energy grids are postponed until West Asian tensions subside.

Strategic Opportunities for India

- **Port Upgrades**: Enhance port infrastructure to support IMEC integration.
- Economic Zones: Develop Special Economic Zones (SEZs) along corridor nodes to attract trade and investment.
- **Domestic Logistics**: Improve logistics networks and increase digitalization to streamline the supply chain.
- **Manufacturing Competitiveness**: Strengthen manufacturing capacity to better integrate into global value chains and position India as an alternative supply chain hub.

IMEC Secretariat: A Proposed Solution

- **Establishment Need**: Setting up an IMEC secretariat could bring organizational structure and facilitate project coordination.
- Primary Roles:

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- Framework Development: Create guidelines for cross-border trade processes.
- **Research**: Conduct empirical studies on the corridor's benefits for participant countries.
- **Engagement**: A clearer project structure may attract neighboring countries to join IMEC.

Conclusion

- Current Trajectory: The eastern section shows promise, while the western side is hindered by geopolitical issues.
- India's Role: A pivotal moment for India to enhance its infrastructure, logistics, and manufacturing to maximize IMEC benefits.
- **Future Prospects**: The corridor's full potential relies on regional stability and India's ability to position itself within global supply chains.
