NEWS: Prime Minister participates in the 6th BIMSTEC Summit, Thailand

WHAT'S IN THE NEWS?

At the 6th BIMSTEC Summit in Thailand, India proposed a 21-point action plan focused on trade, disaster management, digital cooperation, and youth engagement. The summit reaffirmed BIMSTEC's role as a key platform for regional integration, with India positioning it as a strategic alternative to SAARC.

6th BIMSTEC Summit and India's Active Participation

- Prime Minister Narendra Modi participated in the 6th BIMSTEC Summit hosted by Thailand, the current chair, under the theme "Prosperous, Resilient and Open BIMSTEC."
- He presented a 21-point action plan aimed at expanding cooperation across connectivity, trade, digital infrastructure, disaster management, and youth engagement.
- During the visit, PM Modi was also gifted the **World Tipitaka: Sajjhaya Phonetic Edition** by Thailand's Prime Minister, symbolizing Buddhist civilizational links.

India-Led Initiatives at the Summit

• Business and Trade

- Proposed setting up a BIMSTEC Chamber of Commerce to facilitate crossborder trade and business networking.
- India to host a **BIMSTEC Business Summit annually**.
- Called for a **feasibility study** on trade using **local currencies** to enhance financial integration.

• Digital Cooperation

- India to conduct a **pilot study** for digital infrastructure sharing based on India's **Digital Public Infrastructure (DPI)** model.
- Proposed UPI connectivity between BIMSTEC countries for cross-border digital payments.

• Disaster Management

- Announced the establishment of a BIMSTEC Centre of Excellence for Disaster Management in India.
- India to host the **4th joint exercise** between disaster management authorities this year.

• Security and Institutional Dialogue

- India to host the first Home Ministers' Meeting under the BIMSTEC framework.
- Emphasis on combating transnational crimes and ensuring internal security coordination.

• Human Resource Development

- Launched the BODHI initiative (BIMSTEC for Organised Development of Human resource Infrastructure): India will train 300 youth from member countries annually.
- Expanded **scholarship offerings** to BIMSTEC students at Nalanda University and Forestry Research Institute.

• Energy Cooperation

- The **BIMSTEC Energy Centre** in Bengaluru is now operational.
- Push for **cross-border electric grid interconnection** to promote energy trade.

• Youth and Cultural Engagement

- India to host the BIMSTEC Young Leaders' Summit.
- Announced the BIMSTEC Hackathon and Young Professional Visitors Programme.
- India to host the BIMSTEC Athletics Meet (2025) and the First BIMSTEC Games in 2027.
- India will organize a **Traditional Music Festival** to promote cultural ties.

• Connectivity and Maritime Infrastructure

• India to establish a **Sustainable Maritime Transport Centre** to enhance policy coordination, innovation, and research in maritime transport.

Key Agreements and Documents Adopted

- Bangkok Declaration (Summit Declaration)
 - Reaffirms shared commitments under the theme of "Prosperous, Resilient, and Open BIMSTEC."
 - Sets the tone for future strategic priorities and regional cooperation.

BIMSTEC Bangkok Vision 2030

- A roadmap aligned with UN SDGs and Thailand's Bio-Circular-Green (BCG) Economy.
- Focuses on trade, climate resilience, poverty alleviation, and inclusive tourism.

BIMSTEC Maritime Transport Cooperation Agreement

- Aims to improve maritime connectivity, port cooperation, and document recognition among member countries.
- Provides for a **Joint Shipping Coordination Committee** and structured **dispute resolution**.

• Rules of Procedure for BIMSTEC Mechanisms

• Complements the **BIMSTEC Charter (2022)** by enhancing decision-making, accountability, and institutional functioning.

MoUs Signed

- With **IORA**: Boosts maritime and blue economy cooperation.
- With **UNODC**: Strengthens collaboration in counter-narcotics and criminal justice reforms.

• Approval of the Eminent Persons Group (EPG) Report

• Offers long-term vision for **institutional reform**, **prioritization of sectors**, and strategic planning.

About Tipitaka (Gift to PM Modi)

- The **Tripitaka** (or Tipitaka) is the foundational collection of Buddhist scriptures, also known as the **Pali Canon** in Theravada Buddhism.
 - Vinaya Pitaka: Rules for monastic life.
 - Sutta Pitaka: Buddha's sermons and discourses.
 - **Abhidhamma Pitaka**: Philosophical and psychological interpretation of Buddhist teachings.

About BIMSTEC

- Founded in 1997 (originally as BIST-EC), later renamed BIMSTEC when Nepal and Bhutan joined in 2004.
- Members: Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Myanmar, and Thailand.
- Represents 1.7 billion people and a GDP of \$4.5 trillion.
- Secretariat: Dhaka, Bangladesh.
- **Chairmanship**: Rotates alphabetically (currently held by Thailand, to be taken over by Bangladesh).



Why BIMSTEC Matters for India

- Strategic Relevance
 - Serves as a bridge between South and Southeast Asia, supporting India's Act East Policy.
 - Important for India's maritime and security strategy in the **Indo-Pacific**.
- Alternative to SAARC
 - **SAARC's stagnation** due to Indo-Pak tensions has shifted India's focus to BIMSTEC.
 - BIMSTEC has successfully adopted a Charter and conducted multiple summits.
- Connectivity Initiatives
 - Kaladan Multi-Modal Project, Trilateral Highway, and BBIN Motor Vehicle Agreement enhance physical connectivity.
 - Master Plan for Transport Connectivity and Maritime Transport
 Agreement aim to deepen trade and mobility.
- Energy & Blue Economy Cooperation
 - India hosts the BIMSTEC Energy Centre and is promoting electric grid interconnection.
 - Leads cooperation on renewables, port logistics, and marine conservation.

• Security and Disaster Management

- India leads BIMSTEC in counter-terrorism, cybersecurity, and disaster response.
- Hosted the 4th Disaster Management Exercise and launched a Centre of Excellence for Disaster Management.

• Trade and Economic Integration

- Push for finalizing the **BIMSTEC FTA**.
- Hosting Business Summits, Chambers of Commerce, and promoting local currency trade.

• Cultural Diplomacy and Youth Engagement

- Hosting music festivals, youth summits, and sports events to promote regional bonding.
- Launched BODHI programme for youth training and expanded scholarships at Indian universities.

How BIMSTEC Differs from SAARC

Feature	BIMSTEC	SAARC
Geography	South + Southeast Asia (Bay of Bengal focus)	Only South Asia
Pakistan's Membership	Excluded	Included (source of major deadlock)
Political vs Functional	Primarily functional cooperation	Hampered by political tensions
Summits	4 held since 2016	None since 2014
Sectoral Leadership	Distributed across members	Not formalized
India's Role	Widely accepted	Often contested by Pakistan

Challenges Facing BIMSTEC

- Slow Implementation of projects like the Kaladan Project and FTA.
- Weak Institutional Capacity: BIMSTEC Secretariat is underfunded and understaffed.
- Over-Reliance on Consensus slows progress on contentious issues.

- Intra-member Political Tensions: Myanmar's internal crisis, India–Nepal border issues, and Bangladesh–Myanmar migration tensions.
- Low Intra-Regional Trade: Currently under 10%, despite regional economic potential.
- Lack of Public Engagement and Visibility in the media or among citizens.
- **Competing Platforms**: ASEAN, BRI initiatives, and IORA offer alternative partnerships.



Major BIMSTEC Initiatives

- Charter and Rules of Procedure: Legal structure adopted in 2022 and 2025.
- Master Plan for Transport Connectivity: Roadmaps for infrastructure and logistics.
- Maritime Transport Agreement: Signed in 2025 to improve coastal shipping.
- **BFTAFA**: Signed in 2004 but still pending implementation.

- **Disaster Management SOPs** and **exercises (DMEx)** institutionalized post-2004 tsunami.
- **Energy Grid Interconnection**: MoU signed in 2018; work ongoing.

Way Forward for BIMSTEC

- Accelerate Project Implementation: Set timelines and monitoring frameworks for FTA and transport projects.
- Strengthen BIMSTEC Secretariat: Provide resources, autonomy, and create a BIMSTEC Development Fund.
- **Boost Digital and Physical Connectivity**: Complete key infrastructure and promote cross-border fintech and data exchange.
- Increase Private Sector Participation: Institutionalize Business Forums, Summits, and incubators.
- **Expand Sectoral Cooperation**: Focus on agriculture, public health, and climate resilience.
- Enhance Security Cooperation: Conduct joint trainings, intelligence exchanges, and cybersecurity frameworks.
- **Promote Shared Regional Identity**: Scale up soft diplomacy through sports, music, education, and exchange programs.

Conclusion

The 6th BIMSTEC Summit reflects India's growing influence in shaping a regional architecture centered around prosperity, connectivity, and security in the Bay of Bengal. With its emphasis on actionable cooperation, BIMSTEC is poised to emerge as a dynamic alternative to SAARC and a cornerstone of India's Indo-Pacific vision.
