Inclusive Growth and Regional Balance – Unlike capital-intensive industries, tourism is decentralized. It transfers wealth from urban centers to rural peripheries through homestays, eco-tourism, and festivals like the Taj Mahotsav, providing livelihoods for artisans, women, and youth.

Cultural Diplomacy – Tourism acts as a vehicle for "Brand India." Post-G20, global travel searches for India rose by 45%, repositioning the country not just as a land of monuments, but as a safe, diverse, and modern global destination.

Government Measures for Promoting Cultural Heritage

The Government of India has transitioned from a "circuit-based" approach to a "destination-centric" model through several flagship initiatives –

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1. Strategic Schemes

Regulatory Friction – Complex inter-state vehicle permits and high GST rates (18–28%) on luxury hotels make Indian tourism less price-competitive than Southeast Asian peers like Thailand or Vietnam.
